PRINCIPAL'S REFLECTION

Has a family member or friend recently had a baby or about to have a baby? Struggling for a gift idea? I appreciate that my following suggestion would make many people balk at the lack of 'warm, soft, eyecatching or cuddly', but I certainly would have appreciated the following gift when I was a father of my new-born: "The Social World of Children Learning to Talk" by Professor Betty Hart and Professor Todd Risley. Some key conclusions from their unparalleled study that involved 13000 hours over two and a half years, include:

- Regardless of a family's income, educational level of parents or the household postcode, research undertaken by Hart and Risley concludes that, up to the age of three especially, the more time parents spent talking with their child day-to-day, the more rapidly the child's vocabulary was likely to be growing and the higher the child's eventual IQ.
- In a typical hour, some families in the study spent twice as much time interacting with their children than other parents, giving their children affirmative feedback an average of more than 30 times per hour some children heard a prohibition twice as often as they heard an affirmative feedback; these differences in early family experience translated into striking disparities in the children's accomplishments at age 3 in terms of predictors of success in school and the workplace, such as IQ scores and vocabulary growth rates.
- By the time the children were 4 years old some would have heard more than 8 000 000 affirmatives from their parents, whereas others would have heard fewer than 80 000, with these children having 13 million fewer words of cumulative language experience than the group that is exposed to regular high levels of conversation.
- The first 3 years of a child's life experience put in place a trajectory of vocabulary growth and the foundations of analytic and symbolic competencies that will make a lasting difference to how children will perform in later years.

The data shows that the most important aspect of parent talk is its **amount**, which is even more enhanced in its positive impact on the child if this increased amount of talk is embedded in parent-child conversation: speaking and listening in partnership with another person. A key finding from this study is probably best expressed by the statement that "what children need from adults is time." As a parent of 'adult children' I tend to agree with the following quote by Dr Seuss in my reflection of how fleeting is our time as parents of our young children, and how important is our role during these very early formative years, "How did it get so late so soon."

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Homework

Our school Homework Policy has recently had a review as part of our three-year policy review that is undertaken by members of the School Board and staff. The updated Homework Policy endeavours to highlight the focus of homework as being enhancing spelling, reading and numeracy skills - knowledge, understandings and skills that are a reflection of what students are engaged in at the time. The updated policy has been loaded on our school website and will be included in next year's School Diary. A summary of the policy includes:

GUIDELINES


•Homework assigned should: be designed to allow students to complete tasks at a suitable level of independence with a relatively high success rate; involve parents in appropriate ways (such as reading with/to or hearing times-tables or various spelling activities); be purposeful; allow students to practice a skill or process that they can currently do independently but not fluently; allow for elaboration on content that has been addressed in class in order to deepen students' knowledge, skills or understandings; provide opportunities for students to explore topics of their own interest.

AIMS


- To assist students to develop worthwhile study habits, which will equip them with strategies to promote independent learning and time-management skills.
- To provide opportunities for positive support roles for parents to assist their children.
- To be conscious that homework does not encroach on extra-curricular experiences that students enjoy and from which they gain considerable benefit.

PROCEDURES

- Students are expected to allocate time at home to complete homework.
- Reading daily is one of the most important homework elements for all students.
- There is an expectation that, if there is no reasonable reason provided by parents for students failing to complete homework, that tasks set for homework or other tasks would be completed during part of designated playtime.
- Students are expected to demonstrate pride in their homework by completing the work neatly and returning it on time.
