PRINCIPAL'S REFLECTION

The term, 'enlightenment' is couched in a historical perspective that aligns to growth and progress, of a quest for reason and reliance of experiences and senses. It appears that the fruits of the Age of Enlightenment have provided many of us with a measure of health, wealth, freedom and security that would have been unimaginable to our pre-modern ancestors.

As educators, and parents are their child's prime educators, arguably our goal is to enable enlightenment in our children in an effort to allow them to secure a bright and secure future. In the book of John (8:12) Jesus said, "I am the Light of the world; he who follows Me will not walk in the darkness, but will have the Light of life." Without knowing the context of Jesus' words (seven times in the book of John, Jesus uses 'I am' statements) I am very aware of how the literal text of the Bible and its interpretation can be at odds - for example I have read that the translation of 'light' in the verse can also be interpreted as 'fire'. "Light," for the Jewish person, was the ultimate ideal, a representation of salvation, knowledge, and goodness. For Jesus to claim to be the "light of the world" was no small thing. In fact, it is a claim to equality with God. Even further, the Greek of this passage indicates Jesus' claim to be "the" light, not merely "a" light.

What is interesting for those of us seeking 'enlightenment' in the sense of being a better person, a person of positive influence in our world, is the allegorical qualities of 'light' and 'fire' in the quest for enlightenment. To be enlightened is not necessarily a passive stumbling in the dark being guided by a light that occasionally flickers and wanes; rather it may involve being exposed to the light and heat of the fire of enlightenment, where new knowledge or new experiences create new knowledge and understandings for us, resulting in new perspectives, new directions even a different paradigm.

As we continue with this year's Lenten journey, a journey that should involve inner-reflection in an endeavour to be more enlightened, Jesus's bold statement has significant resonance in bringing some 'fire' to the process.

Reading Intervention - Parent Information Session this Friday 2.00pm (all welcome)

Literacy skills are fundamental to students' progress throughout school. Reading is a complex skill that requires development in oral language, phonological awareness, phonics, fluency and comprehension. Our school is now fortunate to have access to the Minilit and Macqlit programmes. Teacher assistants attended professional development in these programmes in 2019 and are currently implementing small group sessions with students from years 1-6. MiniLit and MacqLit both operate as targetted programs which provide systematic support to help students focus on the development of explicitly identified reading skills. Both programs focus on developing and embedding core literacy skills such as decoding, fluency and comprehension and aim to develop more rapid automatics and efficient word recognition strategies. Students benefit from attending their regular classroom literacy lessons, as well as MiniLit or MacqLit lessons. Both the MiniLit and MacqLit programs regularly collect student data to track progress and Mrs Badcock and Mrs Marshall work closely with the classroom teachers and teacher assistants to ensure the students are receiving targeted teaching at their point of need. The programs complement our whole-school focus on supporting all students' literacy skills.

Year 2 News

As part of the Year 2's Design and Technologies unit students have been finding out about "paddock to plate." We watched documentaries on wheat farming and flour production. Students designed and made their own loaf of bread. A big thank you to Mrs Watkins for her assistance with this activity.

Our 'Inquiring Minds' birth to 4 program operates every Friday from 9.00am to 10.30am. This program involves considerable focus on communicating to parents the learning intentions of important activities that are associated with early years learning. Mrs Stoessiger and Mrs Klug will be working together from to engage parents in early years learning experiences that will ensure children who are enrolling in kindergarten, will be informed in regards to developing key social, emotional, physical and cognitive skills and understandings. School Swimming Carnival - Thursday 12th March

A final program was distributed to families last week, however, a summary of the day includes:

- 9.30am 12.30pm Students in Years 3, 4, 5 & 6 will be involved in swimming events and some novelty events at the Latrobe pool. Students should bring a plastic or other small bag with their towel and any change of clothes to take with them to the pool rather than take their school bag to and from the pool.
- 12.30pm 2.30pm Students in Prep, Year 1, Year 2 will be involved in novelty events at the Latrobe pool according to the following timetable:

Students in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 will be participating in races for selection to represent the school at the NW Catholic Schools' Swimming Carnival that will be conducted in Burnie on Thursday 19th March. The school canteen will still operate on this day and Sunscreen will be provided by the school and available at the pool for students to apply. Parents may take children home from the pool provided school staff are informed prior to the day please to ensure their child or children bring their school bags to the pool - school bags will be left at school unless teachers are informed that a child will be taken home from the pool by a parent. Parents of children in Prep, Years 1 and 2 may assist their own child only in the change rooms.
