PRINCIPAL'S REFLECTION

Through my readings of Abraham Lincoln, I am a quiet fan - I appreciate him as a man who acquired significant responsibility and had broad and enduring positive influences despite enormous obstacles. He stated, "As our case is new, we must think and act anew." We are certainly in times that expect us to 'think anew' and this can offer us challenges, which, if we have sufficient time and talent in our midst, enable these challenges to transform into significant **opportunities**. Staff at St Patrick's are certainly involved in considerable conversations regarding how we, with sufficient guidance and support, can offer opportunities for positive student learning outcomes in the midst of considerable change enforced upon us by cultural constraints.

Sunny Verghese, the founder and chief executive of the world's third largest agricultural conglomerate, Olam International, is quoted as saying, "I'll begin with a confession. I'm 59 years old and until the age of 45, 15 years ago, I had absolutely no clue about what sustainability, what nature and what the environment meant to our lives. My 'road to Damascus' moment was through my children. Fortunately my wife has environmental intelligence, and our children took after her, so they also have some environmental intelligence. So my children told me that you have operations in roughly 70 countries, 74,000 employees, dealing with 4.8 million farmers. What is the purpose of all this overwhelming effort if you can't use that influence and reach to leave this world a better place?" Although a canny businessman, it is heartening to appreciate the value he places in his children's views - he learns from his children. Such a lesson should encourage you as parents as many of you enter a phase of indeterminate and, most probably, a not inconsiderable length, where you will have a more ongoing and constant relationship with your children. These are times of enormous opportunity! I appreciate that they will be tempered by considerable challenges that result from a different social paradigm, however, by listening to and working with your children, I can only imagine at what wonders may emerge.

Please be assured that our staff are working collectively and creatively on a model of educational delivery for term 2 that will hopefully be engaging and interesting. Please also be assured that you remain an important part of a unique, supportive school community - please feel welcome to ring me at any time to discuss question, raise concerns or just to talk. I certainly encourage you to take courage from the following scripture reference and to be buoyed by the prospects that might appear challenges, but through diligent preparation and with a lens of hope, become opportunities: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus". Philippians 4: 6-7

Parent-Student-Teacher Meetings


Today teachers have been ringing those parents who responded to our invitation to be involved in Parent-Teacher meetings to discuss some of their child's or children's achievements and challenges in 2020. Some goal-setting should also be an important feature of these conversations. These meetings will continue tomorrow and Thursday.

Teachers have also been making contact withy all families in their respective classes yesterday and today. The purpose of these discussions are three-fold:

- Offer any guidance on the 'School-supported, Home-based Learning Resource packs that were distributed to families last Friday.
- Advise families that a number of meals are available to support families families are requested to contact Mr Linhart, Tameka or Lennice to confirm a meal is available and if they can pick the meal up before 5.00pm (or a meal can be delivered.)
- Clarify that Term 2 education delivery will incorporate aspects of **online learning**, **print-based learning** and **regular 'catch-ups'** including evaluations and feedback from teachers to the student and parent. We envisage the program to be quite structured and resource rich.

Home-Based Learning Tips

- Create a Daily Schedule that reflects a typical school day literacy focus of 90 minutes; numeracy focus of 90 minutes; other studies of 60 minutes; ensure children are aware of time expectations for tasks (e.g. 'after 20 minutes of productive work, have a 5 minute break - walk, look out the window, stretch etc; stop work altogether after 90 minutes and have a longer break.)
- Set up a distinct learning space; relatively free of distraction.
- Encourage other interests.

Project Compassion

Holy Week - Beginning this Sunday 5th April

epitomises the central theme of Holy Week – God's unqualified love for us as expressed by Jesus' sacrifice on Good Friday. The stories associated with Holy Week are central to our Christian faith. They are stories that reflect qualities that would appeal to any Hollywood producer: Love, drama and deceit followed by betrayal, which leads to the horrific death of the main character. Churches will be closed for the usual Holy week obligations, however, faith is as much a personal, inner response as it is a celebration of shared perspectives by way of gathering together. As we, as individuals, celebrate Palm Sunday this Sunday we can only gain a glimpse of Jesus' feelings as he rode into Jerusalem, knowing that the same people welcoming him with joyous acclaim would turn on him and demand his death by Friday. How often have we turned on those who bring news that does not accord with our own selfish desires? Are we Palm Sunday people in all things, or do we allow our own concerns to predominate our relationships so that we become 'Good Friday people', diminishing others and being unproductive? Just as members of our school and wider community come to terms with the lack of the intimacy of many former daily relationships with others, perhaps our Holy Week journey this year might invigorate within us a deeper sense of the love that God has for through the story of sacrifice and renewal that is the Easter story.

Learning at Home' initiative for Term 2 2020


With greatly reduced student numbers this week, although staff are rostered to supervise students, the extra time away from face-to-face teaching is allowing teachers to commence the important and challenging task of discernment and action in our collective goal of creating a new form of educational delivery to commence at the start of term 2 that will be school-supported and home based, which will have the title, 'Learning at Home.' A model for planning and delivery that staff any \$t Patrick's will be working on this week and next week is outlined below:

- 1. Using Term 2 Scope and Sequences, teachers develop intentional packages of learning organised into two week blocks. Each two week block may be further broken down into smaller packages appropriate to the age of students and frequency of the subject.
- 2. The first two week block is prepared, resourced and distributed, either electronically or in hard copy, in readiness for the first day of Term 2. Clear learning intentions and success criteria will be developed to accompany each two week package.
- 3. Teachers supporting learning at home divide their time between three learning and teaching activities:
 - Real time connection with students (students connecting online or by phone.)
 - Providing timely feedback to students for work being undertaken.
 - Preparing the next two week package.
- 4. This three-step process will provide a useful structure to guide the preparation of learning opportunities:
 - Acquire knowledge and skills
 - · Make meaning
 - Transfer understanding
- 5. The two week cycles of delivery (Now) and planning (Next) will support teachers to be flexible and adaptive in responding to collective and individual student needs, and to the ever changing situation, while at the same time providing structure and direction. It also supports teachers in identifying ongoing opportunities for collecting evidence of student learning.

We plan to offer families an opportunity to trial this new model early next week; we will be communication with you via Compass, with the same communication lodged on our school website under the tab, 'Learning at Home'. Having these two sources of communication is an effort on our behalf to convey the same information to all members of our school community at the same time - a reminder for families to please register for Compass to be notified of any updates; these updates will also be lodged on the school website for future reference. This is a challenging, and quite exciting, opportunity and our staff are working as effectively as ever in being collegial and student focused.


Lessons from nature



CATHOLIC EDUCATION TASMANIA OFFERS SUPPORT TO PARENTS FINANCIALLY IMPACTED BY COVID-19 (Media Release by Dr Gerard Gaskin, Executive Director Catholic Education Tasmania)

Catholic Education Tasmania is offering support to parents financially impacted by Coronavirus, who may be experiencing difficulty paying school fees. Executive Director of Catholic Education in Tasmania Dr Gerard Gaskin, reassured parents experiencing genuine financial hardship that their child's enrolment is safe.

"Your child is an important part of our community. An inability to pay fees at this time will not compromise your child's place at our schools. We will work with you to find a solution to what will hopefully be a temporary financial hardship," Dr Gaskin said.

Catholic Education Tasmania's Fee Assistance Policy forms the basis of a response to affected families. A condensed Fee assistance application form is now available (via our school website or upon request from the school office) to parents and guardians, allowing them to provide an explanation of their current circumstances and the assistance they feel they need at this time. School finance staff will assess each application subject to criteria.

"I am aware that many families will have unfortunately lost employment or business income due to Coronavirus. Catholic Education Tasmania is committed to providing fast, flexible and confidential financial assistance to support families with managing school fee commitments for 2020." Dr Gaskin thanked Catholic Education Tasmania teachers and staff who are committed to continue working and supporting students and families through the complex months ahead.

Helped a friend when he was stuck, Learnt that water runs off a duck.


Looked at words from left to right, Agreed to differ, not to fight. So please,
