PRINCIPAL'S REFLECTION

The nineteenth century philosopher, Arthur Schopenhauer, stated, 'Boredom is just the reverse side of fascination: both depend on being outside rather than inside a situation, and one leads to the other.' With the recent change imposed on what we took for granted as our social 'norms', many of our temporal markers have disappeared and perspectives may be shifted as we have new opportunities to engage less, but at arguably a deeper level that can allow for more discernment. With more time on our hands, occasionally we hear the comment that people have become prone to boredom.

Lars Svendsen, Professor of Philosophy, University of Bergen, Norway, published, 'A philosophy of Boredom' in 1999 and he inferred that boredom is not necessarily about not having anything to do, rather it is engaging in tasks that don't matter to the individual on a personal level; it is a lack of meaning. To experience something as meaningful is to care about something or someone. Parents and educators are always challenged to promote this important aspect that relates to 'meaning' when we are planning our 'lessons' with our children or students. We are all aware of the double-edged sword that is 'repetition' as both a tool for enhancing the development of skills and understandings, whilst also being prone to becoming boring. This 'situational boredom' implies an experience might begin exciting and be fun at first, however, through repetition, the experience becomes shallow and the person soon grows tired of the experience - there isn't much more to find. As our personal and social boundaries became more confined over the past few months, we had to be more thoughtful in our responses to 'the everyday.'

References to boredom are found in ancient texts - Solomon in the book of Ecclesiastics is quoted "Vanity of vanities! All is vanity"." Seneca also wrote of boredom - a condition he ascribed to the privileged few. Social commentary of the late 1700s has increasing references to boredom, corresponding with a growing affluence, self-actualisation and individualism. It appears that the more time we have on our hands, the more social and personal wealth that we have at our disposal, the greater the propensity for boredom. However, boredom can

teach us much; it is not necessarily a negative. Anthony store in his book, 'Solitude' infers that the individual should allow boredom to 'hit you' - it might have something to teach each individual, providing a voice of conscience, pressing each of us to ask ourselves, 'What do I care about?'

Boredom can provide opportunities to reorientate our lives - how do we deal with empty time; where are we placing meaning to attachments - to people or objects? Deep boredom can create anxiety because it reveals something about ourselves that being busy has prohibited. For those individuals who do not have a clue about what he or she cares about, there is conflict. Each individual, each school community and each state and nation will undoubtedly have a wonderful opportunity from this current dramatic social change to reflect on how we 'engaged in our time' in our individual and collective efforts to create an individual meaning.

Canteen

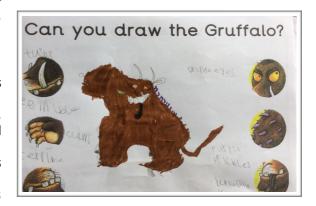

School Chess Competition

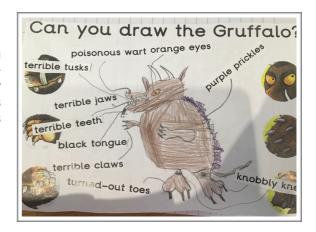
As per the Friday correspondence to families via Compass, Mr Angliss offered to organise an Online Chess competition. As we received only one nomination this initiative is not viable.

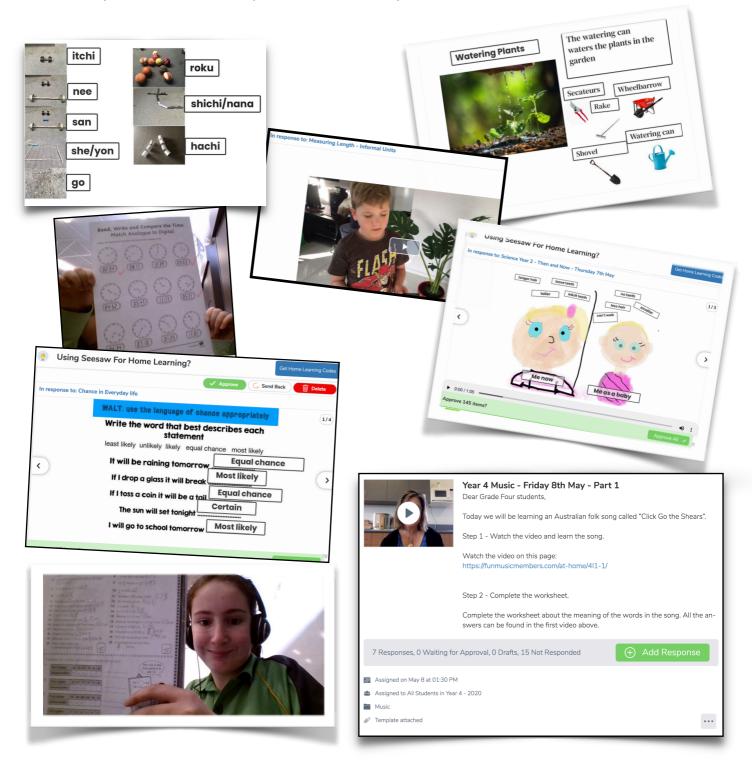
