#### PRINCIPAL'S REFLECTION

There is a distinct joy to life when encountering new experiences. As we slowly emerge from a time that was characterised by empty highways, singularlyfocused news events and unclear horizons, it is timely to reflect upon our experiences from being part of the quite dramatic change in our social, emotional and vocational horizons. Hilaire Pierre Belloc was one of the most prolific writers in England during the early twentieth century and his Catholic faith was a strong influence on his works. He stated, "There was a shepherd the other day up at Findon Fair who had come from the east by Lewes with sheep, and who had in his eyes that reminiscence of horizons which makes the eyes of shepherds and of mountaineers different from the eyes of other men." As people of hope, we come to terms with, and endeavour to make the very best, of times when our horizons are obscured, living with the expectation that circumstances will change, that "this too, shall pass."

A reflection of our school community's endeavours to 'expand the vision' in the midst of a diminishing horizon includes:

- Staff who have certainly worked collaboratively and creatively to support learning in quite disparate circumstances that often had pressing deadlines, providing meaningful learning opportunities regardless of context, including timely and focused feedback.
- Parents who patiently restructured routines, communicated concerns and celebrations respectfully and who embarked with a refreshing enthusiasm on supporting school-based educational initiatives, no doubt appreciating the important role that relationship plays in any learning experience.
- Students who participated with due consideration of the increased level of independence required, taking on responsibility that no doubt will provide a subtle empowerment of their own role in future formal learning engagements.

As individuals who are part of various communities we bring to, and take away with us, various knowledge, skills and understandings. School staff will be reflecting on our school's delivery of education during this time of considerable imposed change, with the intent to identify aspects of our response that we might incorporate, or use as an example when we plan to support student outcome, while also sustaining staff welfare. As our individual and collective horizons become clearer again, our current reflections will hopefully remind us that we have an individual and collective capacity that is often untapped and that quiet, solitary introspection has as much merit as attending meetings and collective agendas, which is expressed well by the nineteenth century American poet James Lowell, who stated, "Solitude is as needful to the imagination as society is wholesome for the character."

# Online schooling from home v school. (Zarlia and Maddy 13th May)

Zarlia: I enjoyed working from home but there were lots and lots of distractions. The thing I enjoyed most about working from home is you can eat whenever you want. The thing I most enjoy about school is that you get to see some friends and I can ask for my teachers help. Home schooling is a bit boring as well because you don't get to go outside to play with friends. I feel this especially as I am an only child and I don't have any friends who live reasonably close to me. Home schooling might be better for people who like to work in peace and quiet as school can get very noisy. Being at school is great for parents who have still got their jobs but work in a very unworkable or 'not for kids' place. School is a good place for kids who want to go outside with other people or want to play.

Maddy: Today is hard for some people like parents and kids, because some people have lost their jobs for now. I was at home for about 6 weeks and it was frustrating but I had to get used to it because I knew that I was going to be at home for a while. It is normal for kids and parents to be scared or frightened. I felt a bit like that at the start. I



honestly think that I prefer online school at school because you still get to see your friends and your teachers. With only some people here, you get to play with some people you don't normally play with or talk to so you get to learn about new people and with only some people at school sometimes there is not as much noise. Online schooling at home is good sometimes but I got quite frustrated with myself. A couple good things about working from home is that you have family with you and you get to eat basically whenever you want and I sometimes found that great.

#### **Initiative 1 Low-Income Family Support:**

NBN is assisting low income families by working with retail service providers to offer low cost NBN connections to families that have no current NBN Connection. Each provider is offering slightly different options for families, but please advise your families to ask the following when contacting providers:

- For a copy of the eligibility criteria (as each provider is different).
- For a "No Lock in Contract".
- For a full summary of any and all costs that could be incurred between now and 30 September 2020 (Example costs include; Install Charge, Setup Fee, New Development Charge, Modem Cost, Monthly fee, Exit Fee).

# Family technology plan


The family technology plan helps parents, carers and children establish rules around the usage of smart devices in and around your home.




#### Year 2 – In the Cloud (Mrs Fenton)
